Shire of Harvey achieve Youth Strategy Goals by supporting grass roots organisations

For a number of years, the Brunswick Junction Community Resource Centre has applied for funding via the Shire of Harvey (SOH) annual budget submissions. To date, the Centre has been successful with its grant applications.

This funding goes a long way in ensuring the delivery of a safe and well-managed Youth Program for Brunswick. The funding covers the cost of a Youth Coordinator, an assistant and \$1,000 per term to cover the cost of snacks, equipment and supplies. The CRC contributes to the cost of the program in terms of insurances, venue overheads, administration and collaborative support for ad-hoc annual youth and family-focused activities; for example, Youth Week and Children's Week.

This year with the adoption of the SOH Youth Strategy Plan, the funding is helping the Shire to achieve its goals by supporting grassroots organisations to positively engage with youth, as well as providing the organisational tools and resources to promote and support youth beyond the organisation's core program.

For example;

4.1.1 Continue to provide financial and resource support to existing youth services.

2.2.1 Administer Youth Taskforce involving key stakeholders.

2.2.2 Advocate for youth support service delivery and outreach.

3.4.1 Promote school holiday programs delivered by Shire service Library, Recreation Centres and Community Development).

The biggest achievement for the Brunswick Youth Program so far has been the longevity of relationships that the Coordinators have been able to form with the town's young people. A noteworthy feature of each Coordinator has been their connection with the local schools attended by their children:

Karina with her three children Jacob, Mathew and Emma Sewell.

Jo with her three children Danni, Kiara and Holli Dalton.

Current coordinator, Phil with his three children.

The Brunswick Youth Program has always set out to achieve a positive engagement between adults and young people with the aim of promoting youth wellbeing, productivity and achievement.

The Youth Program is broken down into deliverable activities;

- Youth group for Primary School aged youth every Friday afternoon during the school term 3-5pm.
- Late Night for High School aged youth. This has been held every second Friday; however, due to a drop in attendance, this is currently under review.
- Ad-hoc youth and family activities e.g. basketball events or dance nights and holiday programs with the Shire.
- Annual Ad-hoc events e.g. Youth week and Children's week.

The Centre and Youth Program also advocates and supports programs that help shape our young people. For example, the Centre is a support agent for RYDE, which helps young people achieve their 50 supervised driving hours.

The 2020-2021 financial year saw a total of 1017 youth members and their families access the Brunswick Youth Program, which included; Youth group, Late Night, 3x dance nights, a Basket Ball event and additional funded events such as SOH school holiday activities, Drug aware mural workshops and launch, Youth week, Halloween Carnival and Outdoor movie night.

Thank you to the Shire of Harvey, Lottery West, Department of Communities, Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, Meerilinga and Healthway for allowing us to serve our local youth and families. BJCRC



Community Safety Top Priority



Support for Child Care Service in the South West. Seven child care services in the South West will share in the Federal Governments Community Child Care Fund.

Federal Member for Forrest Nola Marino MP said, "This funding is critical in our South West local towns. In some circumstances this will keep the centre operating and in others will increase the number of children they can care for."

"If we can help improve or expand facilities, more families in regional areas can remain in work. We can also help create more local jobs and opportunities to remain working in the local area."

The "Celebrating Rural Transport" theme will feature throughout the showgrounds, with the cooking section calling for entries in the "Truckies' Pie" and "Decorated TRUCKS novelty cake" classes. The theme will also be featured in other sections including Floral Art, Children's Exhibits, Lego, Photography and more! And look out for the new Adult Lego Competition which is attracting a great deal of interest! Brunswick Agricultural Society president, Mark Talbot, says that this year's show will feature the best-ever displays of agricultural machinery and trade equipment. Local trucking business B & J Catalano will be kindly providing a giant sandpit where children can play, complete with Tonka toys! Thanks to WesTrac, older kids won't miss out, with the opportunity to drive a small excavator and view machinery at a showgrounds area which has been dubbed "Digger Park"!

President Mark says that the Grand Parade is shaping up to be the biggest so far, with some of the "Trac Mach" crew" - whom locals know from the annual "Lights On The Hill" event - on board to lend a hand. Young people interested in agriculture can take part in the Ag Challenge, or can check out the stalls by Livestock & Rurual Transport Association and also WA Farmers, which will both be showcasing careers in agriculture. There's excitement among fans of the popular television show "Outback Truckers", with confirmation received that well-known trucker Glen "Yogi" Kendall will be appearing at the show!

The Italian Sausage Competition will be judged on Thursday 21st October, with guest judges including Peter Gianfrancesco from Pete's Chop Shop in Treendale and Angie from Bunbury's Triple M Radio. Amateur brewers can enter the Craft Beer competition, which will be judged at The Rose Hotel Bunbury in the previous week. Winners of both the sausage and beer sections will be announced at a special event on the evening of 21st October, at the Harvey-Brunswick-Leschenault Football Clubrooms. All welcome!

Shire of Harvey achieve Strategic Community Plan Objectives by supporting local organisation

Brunswick Junction Community Resource Centre is able to support the community 30 hours per week thanks to the financial support it receives from the Shire of Harvey and the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.

Since 2005 the Centre has applied for funding from the Shire of Harvey annual budget submission to support a paid administration library and operations role. In 2010 the Centre was lucky enough to secure funding to help complement the SOH funds where the Centre went from being open 1 day a week to 5.

So, in reality, it's taxpayers and ratepayers paying for the service that the Centre offers. The Centre is owned and managed by a volunteer board. You, as a community member, can join at any time and have your opinion heard if you think there is more the Centre could be going for you.

The Centre is fortunate in that it gets plenty of praise from users. The Centre is client-centric - people who come through the door are our priority. The Centre's personnel are public servants and ready to serve.

What does the Centre offer and how does it link to the Shires Strategic Community Plan objectives?

The role of the Centre is to support Business, Economic and Social development through:

Access to free resources and support;

- Local, state and Federal government; Kids sport, hop on the bus, RYDE etc..



.....and he SCORES!!!!

This is the story of the pinnacle of my sporting career. One of the first moves of the new Labour government voted in in England after the end of the Second World War was to make sport compulsory at all schools. At my school Wednesday afternoons were chosen for this and in the winter the choices were Rugby or Rugby. The result in my case was a collection of thirty boys roughly half of whom did not want to be there (including me) and the other half who although keen were too unfit or inept to get into a real team and in the charge of a master who had never played Rugby and had very little grasp of the rules. Several of us developed a system of appearing to chase the ball without every actually reaching it and never being in the right place to get involved in any serious action. On the occasion that is the subject of this chapter things went tragically wrong and one of my fellow slackers received the ball in the middle of the field, he panicked and promptly passed it to me.

All the other slackers were, well, slacking and none of the keener types on my side were close by so I had no option but to set off for the try line. Opposition keen types were mostly behind me and headed in my direction so I was well motivated to get a move on.

Being fairly tall even then I could stay ahead and the only threat was the opposition full-back, a keen type, who came screaming across the field to intercept. Just as we were about to collide I stopped and he went floundering across in front of me. Before he could turn I set off again more concerned with not getting dumped by the pack chasing me than anything else and soon crossed the line to ground the ball for a magnificent try. As was the custom the captain offered me the opportunity to kick the conversion but I declined feeling than I had touched the ball quite enough for one day. Please be circumspect with any further distribution of this story as I now live in New Zealand and should it come to the notice of the New Zealand Rugby authorities or All Black management my residency might be in danger, Rugby being a religion in New Zealand.
