# BRUNSWICK'S PURPLE BENCH



Our Community Resource Centre was recently granted the opportunity to participate in the "Purple Bench Project" which is funded by Linkwest.

The purple bench is an important visual reminder of a conversation that needs to be had in every household, schoolyard, workplace and playground.

Its purpose Is to bring awareness of domestic and family violence and to encourage open discussion about the subject. On every seat there is a helpline for those seeking support or advice. The purple colour is associated, worldwide, with the domestic violence awareness movement.

Our resource centre recognises the importance of promoting the cause associated with purple benches and are keen to be supportive of the movement. Gifted timber from a local supplier and input from the Brunswick Men's Shed, where both the men and ladies pitched in to help build and paint the bench, helped to get the job done! This demonstrates the key to success through collaboration, whilst knowing that our bench was not the only one under construction for another local community group in the town.

We have placed the Purple Bench beside our Children's Playground as a place where anyone can sit quietly, reflect on anything at any time in a safe place and/or share thoughts to seek advice if they wish, without any judgement.

It is also a place for people to remember those who might have family members at risk or who have been victims in the past.


In other news, the extension to Bunbury Outer Ring Road is steadily progressing, with Hynes Road and Martin-Pelusey Road in Waterloo both currently closed. These roads are open to local traffic only until the roadworks are completed. Paris Road in Australind will close as of 4th February at Forrest Highway intersection, for 18 months while works are completed. Extensions to The Promenade are complete and the new section will officially open on 3rd February, providing an alternative route from Treendale area to Leschenault Leisure Centre/Our Lady of Mercy College areas. Also, Marriott Road will be closed between Kemerton Road and Wellesley Road North from Friday 20 January until late February as maintenance is undertaken on the Marriott Road Bridge. Traffic may use Clifton Road and South Western Highway while trucks must detour via Raymond Road and South Western Highway. Further road information is available on the Main Roads WA website.

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## THE COW ON THE CORNER TURNING 50 IN JULY


In early 1973 Brunswick Lions Members Allan could turn into a major disaster, as they Baldwin. Fred Talbot. Les Robinson and Mike Reeve travelled to Albany to see the Cow on the Corner being erected, by Elsie Manning. Although it did not have the exact proportions and detail of a real cow. It was suitable for this purpose.

Measurements were taken so that a stone platform could be accurately prepared. Lion Sam Catalano carted a huge block of stone from the Roelands Quarry after requiring two frontend loaders to lift it onto his truck.

Bunbury Lion Dominic Zoccali donated his time and expertise to ensure when the cow arrived, she could be installed without anv complications.

Lion Murray Piggott offered his truck when the big day arrived to transport the Cow from Albany to Brunswick, he was accompanied by Fred Talbot and Mike Reeve. They departed at 3am so the return trip could be made before dark. Sculpture Elsie Manning was on hand to oversee the loading.

The homeward journey was a steady one, but 300-odd miles was taking its toll, and the legs developed cracks. Worried Lions thought this



watched small pieces of their precious cargo crumbling.

Motorists along the Highway could not believe their eyes. a cow standing on the back of a truck without a cattle crate. However, the steel re enforcement was sufficient to keep monument on her feet, and she spent a comfortable night in the Piggott shed.

The following morning July 11th she drove down the main street and was lowered by crane onto her pedestal, and on July 13th was unveiled by Tom Pearson a prominent farmer and citizen in the district. The damaged legs were patched up and Daisy has remained standing for nearly 50 years.

It is hoped a celebration will be held in July to commemorate our icon.

#### 1. Give yourself permission to feel your feelings. 4. Go for it and learn.

harder to achieve something. goal of the activity itself.

Allow yourself to reflect on and be guided by how you want to feel. For example, healthy and fit! If your resolution is to exercise, frame it as "work out in the morning to de-stress and gain energy" rather than "work out to lose 20 kilos and finally become skinny."

#### 2. Try cutting down instead of cutting out.

Try being flexible and moderate rather than rigid or extreme while you are trying to stop a habit or remove a behaviour. If we try to eliminate entirely the habits we rely on throughout our daily lives, we may crave them even more. For example, if your goal is to stop drinking four cups of coffee a day, don't eliminate coffee entirely from your diet starting on January 1. Try having three cups a day for a week, then two cups per day the following week, and so on.

#### 3. Keep doing what you like doing.

Maintain the activities you enjoy. Rather than stopping your life on January 1 to fixate on your list of resolutions, reflect on what brings you joy and keeps you motivated. Remember that we don't need to eliminate parts of our life to make room for new ones; we can adapt. For example, if your resolution is to spend more time with your family, you don't need to give up your friends. You can simply add family to your calendar. Most of the time we don't have to choose; we just need to think ahead.

Listen to the emotions that give rise to your Embrace mistakes and failures. When we try new resolutions. Our joy, for example, can lead us to things, we aren't destined to be perfect. Rather commit to spending more time with those who than giving up and labelling your goal as bring us joy. Our disappointment is a guide to "impossible" when you fail to reach it, try again. Lean on your friends and family for support. Have the courage and foresight to ask for help perhaps in the form of a reminder. Even though resolutions are "personal" goals, the people you surround yourself with can help make your goals more attainable and provide wisdom and encouragement along the way. You can also be their cheerleader, and support friends and family in trying to achieve their goals. Focusing on others can be rewarding and watching them 'get there' can be inspiring.

#### 6. Give yourself grace.

Incorporate positive affirmations into process of achieving your goals. One of the greatest gifts we can give to ourselves this holiday season and for all of 2023 is selfcompassion.

It will take practice to include yourself in the circle of people you give kindness to. By practising grace and self-compassion, we are not letting ourselves (or others for that matter) "off the hook," but remembering what it is to be human.
