Long-awaited cheering could be heard from Brunswick Oval on July 18 as Harvey-Brunswick-Leschenault Football Club hosted the first game of 2020 against Carey Park. Despite Covid-19 restrictions causing a delayed start to the season, football fans were not disappointed, with the local club scoring convincing wins in all four grades. The 2019 League premiers defeated the Panthers by 80 points, recording the League's 650th Home And Away victory since joining the South-West Football League. This milestone follows the 1121 Home and Away Matches played by the League during that time, leading to a winning percentage of 57.98%.

The re-appointment of last year's coaching team has set the pace for a good season in which players are looking to reprise their premiership success of last year. HBL will host two home games this month - Aug 2 against South Bunbury and Aug 22 in a twilight match against Busselton. The following Saturday will see Lions take on the Harvey Bulls in the hotly-contested derby at Harvey Recreation Ground.

Welcome to August! It's been a crazy few months in Brunswick as the world continues to adapt to a different way of living due to Corona Virus. While Western Australians have been applauding the state government's efforts and restrictions, which have resulted in low numbers of people affected by COVID-19, our eastern states counterparts have been less fortunate with many areas of Victoria and New South Wales currently in strict lockdowns due to a large increase in the number of cases. This has delayed our state government's phase Five lifting of restrictions, with the proposed date moved from July 18 to August 8. Both state and federal governments are urging West Australians, and those in other less-affected states, to avoid complacency and adhere to regular hygiene measures such as physical distancing, frequent hand-washing and staying home when unwell. However, locals are grateful to have fewer limitations imposed on gatherings and businesses, with restaurants and bars able to trade as usual while following health department guidelines.

Sporting clubs have also resumed play, with Harvey-Brunswick-Leschenault Football Club and Brunswick Bowling Club now re-opened and following government advice in regards to distancing and sanitising requirements. Both Brunswick schools are back to in-class learning for term 3, strictly adhering to extra hygiene measures and deeper cleaning procedures. Brunswick churches are holding regular Masses, with contact details tracking of attendees no longer required, but hand sanitiser provided for all.

The big news in town is that the Brunswick Show is set to go ahead on 24th October. The theme "Celebrating Rural Transport" will see many vintage vehicles on display, along with all the usual show day attractions. In an effort to spread out activities and limit crowds due to the pandemic, all equestrian events - which have increased in number - will this year be held on Sunday 25th October. While the other attractions and stalls will run on the Saturday only, there will be free entry on the Sunday for anyone wishing to go along and enjoy the horses.

The Moospaper joins the community in thanking our local volunteers who are doing their best to keep events and activities going in our town, with community group members putting in extra efforts to try and keep us all well. Stay safe everyone! Don't you just LOVE Brunswick?!

## NEWS FROM BEELA VALLEY TC

Residents and staff of Beela Valley Therapeutic Community in Brunswick put on a farewell lunch for Manager Residential Services, Wendy Shannon, on Wednesday, July 15 to wish her luck on her new venture. We are delighted to announce that Palmerston Association in partnership with Wungening Aboriginal Corporation, have won the competitive tender to deliver the AOD (Alcohol and Other Drugs) Program within the brand new Recovery and Rehabilitation Community Unit at Casuarina Prison with an innovative team and culturally secure approach. This new partnership has drawn on our strengths and expertise in residential and community alcohol and other drug programs, adult justice, Aboriginal engagement and case management to design and deliver a tailored, culturally competent and evidence-based Alcohol and Other Drug Program to 128 prisoners that is based on therapeutic community principles. The program name is Solid Steps AOD Recovery Program and will commence in October 2020. Collectively we will be recruiting a new team of 12 Full Time Equivalent staff in coming weeks, with roles to be advertised including Program Manager, Senior Recovery Educator and Recovery Program Worker.

Palmerston Association and Wungening Aboriginal Corporation (the Partnership) currently deliver a range of programs and services funded by State and Federal agencies and commissioning bodies that either directly or indirectly relate to AOD and related issues in institutional, residential and community settings. This collective experience, capability and capacity means that the Partnership has a sound understanding of the current issues that impact on people within the prison system and the rehabilitation of adult offenders. Wendy Shannon, Program Manager Justice, will have responsibility for implementing the Solid Steps Program in partnership with Wungening, and also work on new tender opportunities.

## BRAGG UPDATE

Can you control weeds without funding and volunteer burnout?

BRRAG (Brunswick River Restoration Action Group) has finished another year of keeping weeds under control. Thanks to the successful National Resource Management grant application BRRAG was able to take advantage of a professional contractor to spray weeds along the Brunswick River and its riparian zone for 30kms from the Flynn Road bridge in the east to the Australind bypass in the west (approx. 90 hectares).

It has been an onerous task for BRRAG over the past year; with no new members, aging members, a number of unsuccessful grant applications to local and state governments, increasing responsibilities as an incorporated association and the knowledge that weeds keep growing every year. The near impossible task of finding and being successful with grant applications to fund ongoing projects, such as weed control, as this type of activity is not a showy bricks and mortar project but has significant contribution to the ongoing sustainability of the flora and fauna environments.

In 2006 BRRAG was formed to keep the River flowing as it was deemed un-gradable (2006 River Action Plan for the Brunswick River published by Leschenault Catchment Council). The volunteer group is achieving its aim, to "Keep the river flowing freely and healthily", but need the ongoing support of grant funding to continue to be effective.

Our community education engagement is important to us and where we can we will be present or support our environmental friends, Leschenault Catchment Council and Peel/Harvey Biosecurity Group in educational delivery.

# SMOKE SIGNALS

## From the Brunswick Junction Volunteer Fire & Rescue Service



Twenty-twenty has to go down in our history as one of the strangest years in our 60-year existence. At the beginning of March we had attended the State Open Championships in Perth, we were planning our 60th Birthday celebration to be held in October and we were heading towards a record number of callouts for the year (I was anticipating more than 80, based on what we attended during the previous 9 months). On March 17th we received word from DFES that due to COVID-19 all activities would cease other than our weekly equipment checks and, of course, attending incidents along with a very strict cleaning regime being introduced. This meant, no Meetings, no drills, no competition training, (our Annual Easter State Championships were cancelled), no DFES skills training was held, our 60th birthday was cancelled, no new members were allowed and everything else was put on hold as more and more restrictions were put in place.

The upside of this was that these restrictions meant that fewer people were travelling on the roads and more were staying at home looking after things. So our callout rate dropped dramatically to where we finished the year at 68 incidents. I must take this opportunity to congratulate the members for the way in which they embraced the changes that were introduced. There was no grumbling and no shortcuts taken with the cleaning regime which meant that every callout, all surfaces on both appliances were cleaned and sterilised, all surfaces within the station met the same standard and all PPC was kept clean. Well done, one and all.

Some restrictions were eased enough that we were able to conduct our AGM in June and elections of Office bearers took place. This year we have tried something a little different as far as Office-bearers go and we Elected a Second Lieutenant and an Assistant Apparatus Officer. Other than these two new positions, all other Office-bearers were re-elected for the second year running which shows that the members have the utmost confidence in those holding those positions.

A “handover” was conducted at our July meeting as these positions commence 1st July and the members formally assume their roles. The Firefighter of the Year was announced as well and this year Hayden Moore was the recipient. Hayden has had an outstanding year. He has taken deployments to the Eastern States during their crisis over there as well as deployments within WA. He has taken control as Officer in Charge at quite a few large local incidents as well as joining the Fire & Rescue Association State Youth Advisory Council. Well done Hayden Moore. ## CREAMY WINTER CHICKEN

### INGREDIENTS

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts
- 200g pack cherry tomatoes
- 3 tbsp pesto
- 3 tbsp crème fraîche (fresh basil, if you have it)

### METHOD

1. Heat the oil in a frying pan, preferably non-stick. Add the chicken and fry without moving it until it takes on a bit of colour. Turn the chicken and cook on the other side. Continue cooking for 12-15 mins until the chicken is cooked through. Season all over with a little salt and pepper.
2. Halve the tomatoes and throw them into the pan, stirring them around for a couple of minutes until they start to soften. Reduce the heat and stir in the pesto and crème fraîche until it makes a sauce. Scatter with a few basil leaves if you have them, then serve with rice and salad or mash and broccoli.
