

Next year, the Brunswick Hall will celebrate its 90th anniversary.

My husband always said they built the Hall to commemorate his arrival.

94 years ago, Roy Barnes and his brother Tom from Benger were asked to play the piano and drums for the Brunswick Agricultural Society Show Ball in the Hall. On their way to the function, a wheel came off their old car.

After groping in the dark with lit matches, they eventually found the wheel, along with some wire, to repair it with.

By the time they arrived at the Hall, in a vehicle running on three and a half wheels repaired with wire, they were more than a little late.

The hall was packed with people, so as soon as they arrived, Roy started to play the piano for dancing while Tom set up the drums. Unfortunately, while Tom was trying to assemble his drums, much to his embarrassment, a cymbal fell onto the stage, rolled onto the dance floor, whirling all the way down to the centre of the Hall, stopping with a clang.

After the Ball, Roy and Tom thought they had better charge less for being late, but the Committee decided they had had such a good time they would pay them more, so they went home very happy with two pounds ten shillings each.

Riley Morgan story


For over a hundred years a lonely grave on the hill at Brunswick did not have a headstone until the Brunswick Lions Club Members decided to rectify this and on November 16th 2019 it was unveiled with a small service. The Morgan family were living in a tent, working at the Worsley Timber Mill with their six children. Other workers also had families on the site.

One day, Riley Morgan became sick and his parents realised it was serious, that he had diphtheria and left the other children at the Mill to make their way by horse and dray to Australind, to see Doctor Paris.

Nearing Brunswick, Riley passed away and his parents knew they couldn't take him back to the tent.

As the ground was soft they buried him beside the track.


An advertisement in the West Australian, "Can We Help You" posted by a family member provided the information and the child's name. Unfortunately she passed away shortly after...the family always knew he was buried at Brunswick, but Shire and Australind Cemetery Records could not assist them when they enquired. His death was not recorded. Sometimes the sun shines on the plaque and can be seen from the South Western Highway.

History of Brunswick

EXCERPTS FROM NOTES WRITTEN BY THE LATE MOLLIE CLIFTON IN 1986 ABOUT BRUNSWICK RED CROSS.

MY first Brunswick Red Cross Meeting was at the home of Miss Harriet Partridge in 1936. The main aim as it is to-day was fundraising. We served lunches at the Brunswick Cattle Sales and afternoon teas at sales on farms, which involved many hours of cooking. Marjorie George, who lived at Olive Hill, offered the use of her house, and she also had a very large wood stove in which to cook our cakes, This stove had two ovens with the fire box in the middle.

Four women would arrive about 8.30am, my job weighing the sugar and flour and greasing the tins. Another would wash up, while others prepared the mixture. Later in the afternoon we would ice the cakes. We usually arrived home about 6pm, having cooked and iced over 100 cakes.

Of course, other members cooked in their own homes. For the Red Cross March Appeal, the District was divided into sections and volunteers were asked to collect from farms and homes in those areas.

The difference between them and today is that not every woman could drive a car; some walked long distances and being March was always very hot and lots of flies.

In 1961, a huge fire broke out in Dwellingup and as many women as could cooked scones etc and served refreshments to the firefighters. Many firefighters were suffering sore eyes from the smoke.

We had eye baths to irrigate their eyes.
On moving to Bunbury, I joined the Bunbury
Red Cross and I used to collect along King
Road, do Hospital Visiting and assist with the
Hospital Trolley and help at their Fetes.
Having a Red Cross Shop with second hand
clothing has been a wonderful fundraiser.

Join the Leschenault Catchment Council for a hands-on Bird Box Workshop, a fun, educational morning for nature lovers of all ages. This event is part of both the Community Wildlife Stewardship Event Series and Estuary Connect's Helping the Estuary at Home initiative—supporting local wildlife conservation, right from your own backyard.

Led by wildlife ecologist **Simon Cherriman** and environmental educator Danielle Crichton from The Re-Cyc-Ology Project, this engaging experience will teach you about the fascinating world of tree-hollow-dependent species—like owls, possums, and black cockatoos—and how you can support them by creating nest-boxes using recycled materials.
