

BRUNSWICK IN THE EARLY DAYS

The Railways came to Brunswick in 1892, but only after the Agricultural Society made a strong appeal as the preferred line was to bypass the town. The first Station was just under 100 miles from Perth, and, so local legend has it, the second one, built with the large refreshment rooms, was shifted 100 metres further south. 110 levers were necessary to change the signals-believed to be the largest number outside the Perth area.

The advent of the railway resulted in several important buildings being established, including the post office, the churches, bakeries, boarding houses and a cool drink factory. The first hotel licence was held by a Mrs Kelly, who kept the Black Swan to the east of the railway station. She later had the licence for the Brunswick Tavern, but the Black Swan licence was transferred to the Railway Refreshment Room, which assured them of a lively trade.

Many former train travellers fondly remember the other attraction at the station -the Brunswick pie. for example, that was a must on the all-night journey from Bunbury to Perth.

It was a sad day for residents when the Railway Station was pulled down without public consultation - what a wonderful Museum it would have made.



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
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AN INTRODUCTION TO AI

Recently, we were able to hold an information session that was open to the local community and businesses. Presenter, Craig Holland from IPS delivered an engaging session on Artificial Intelligence (A.I.). It was an informative event where we learnt about the role that A.I. has played in society—from its early stages of development to how it has evolved today.

The main focus of the session was on cyber security, insurance, and computer hygiene, with helpful advice on how to stay safe online. Craig also stressed the importance of having workplace policies in place around the use of A.I. He highlighted that A.I. does not differentiate between cultural or ethical sensitivities and that, while we often assume A.I. is always factual, it cannot distinguish context in the same way humans can. Instead, it operates on the basis of behavioural patterns rather than cultural understanding.

We were reminded that there have been instances where A.I. has selected or interpreted





information inaccurately, reinforcing the importance of always fact-checking any content produced or influenced by A.I.

gardening etc.




